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## Ex-Track Stars Gather at Reunion

About 50 former local track stars reminisced and exchanged yarns covering more than six decades of athletic endeavors at a reunion dinner Tuesday night at the Downtown YMCA.  
 Most of those present competed either for or against the Downtown Y Track Club.  
 Their track histories ranged back to 1897, when the venerable Gus Gressel, now 85, began his fabulous career, up to the 26-year-old Frank Finnerty, an alumnus of Hutch-Tech and Alfred University.  
 Finnerty was an excellent miler whose best time was 4:12—a world record which would have been a world record during the heyday of most of the guests.  
 Among the guests was Hans Oldag, who was a marathon runner in the 1932 Olympic Games in Los Angeles. Another was the colorful George Bertsch, known as the "flying fireman," who

qualified for the 1924 Olympics in Paris in both the 1,500-meter run and the 3,000-meter steeplechase.  
**Fractured Ankle**  
 However, an ankle fracture prevented him from running in the Olympics. He has for many years been a handicapper at local racing events.  
 Herb Mols, past president of the Niagara District AAU, was the guest speaker who related the role of the AAU in track.  
 He also suggested an old-timers' track meet to honor the famous runners of the past and the idea seemed to appeal greatly to those present.  
 Other guests included Gardner Debo, Erie County recreation director, and Miles W. Joyce, former North Tonawanda mayor who was a distance runner.  
 William Whitcher served as toastmaster and Roland Murray was dinner chairman.
