

Herbert Mols Dies; Pioneer of Games

Herbert J. Mols of Amherst, Western Region director and one of the pioneers of the Empire State Games, died early this morning in Millard Fillmore Suburban Hospital, Amherst, after suffering a heart attack at the Games.

Mols, 71, was reviewing the day's activities at the Games' press office on the State University of Buffalo's Amherst Campus shortly after 11 p.m. Saturday when he was stricken.

Michael Abernathy, the Games' executive director, read a statement from the Mols family saying he had died at 12:05 a.m. of cardiopulmonary arrest.

Dubbed "The Father of the Western Region," Mols has had a long amateur athletics career stretching from Fosdick Masten High School to the 1936 Olympic Games in Munich.

As head of the Niagara District of the Amateur Athletics Union, he originally suggested an "Olympics of New York State" in 1976. A plan for the Games was drawn shortly thereafter, and Mols was appointed director of the Western Region.
